



Castalia Fish Hatchery Open House

The Castalia State fish hatchery held its annual open house on Saturday, April 13th, welcoming over 1,200 visitors. The Hatchery is located on 90 acres in Castalia, Ohio, and is the newest of the six state fish hatcheries, only dating to the fall of 1997 when the property was purchased from private interests.

The hatchery consists of 70 indoor rearing troughs, one covered outdoor raceway building, and three outdoor raceways. The indoor troughs and covered raceways are supplied with water from one of the area's many blue-hole aquifers

that produce about 2,500 minute. gallons per The remaining outdoor raceways are supplied with water diverted from Cold Creek (10,000 gallons per minute capacity). Andy Jarrett is the Hatchery Manager, and an ODNR employee for the past 25 years. He said "Castalia is a cold-water fishery; our water is about 50 degrees year-round. We do all of the Steelhead trout that are stocked in Ohio into the Lake Erie tributaries." This cold-water supply allows the hatchery to raise

Steelhead and Rainbow trout. All of the state's Steelhead production occurs at the Castalia Hatchery.

Visitors were welcome to look at newly hatched young Steelhead trout, feed the larger fish with and look at the facilities that produce fish for Ohio

Anglers. The Hatchery wasn't able to display fish eggs at this time; one batch has hatched, and the next batch hasn't arrived yet.

About 450,000 Steelhead trout, each fish 7 to 10 inches long, will be released this year into streams flowing into Lake Erie. Normally, they spend a couple of years in the lake and then return to the streams they were released into. About 80,000 rainbow trout, 11 to 12 inches long, are going to be released into ponds and reservoirs, including the pond at East Harbor State Park in Ottawa County.

Ohio operates six state fish hatcheries, which raised and stocked 40.8 million fish last year. Besides the two kinds of

trout in the Castalia Hatchery, the state hatcheries raise brown trout, Saugeye, walleye, yellow perch, muskellunge, hybrid striped bass, channel catfish and bluegill.

The majority of Ohio's fish populations are sustained through natural reproduction, but stocking is appropriate when natural reproduction cannot sustain a population or there is a need to provide short-term fishing opportunities in specific situations or events.

State fish hatchery funding is provided by the sale of Ohio fishing licenses and the Sport Fish Restoration Act. Enacted in 1950, the Sport Fish Restoration program provides funding for sport fish conservation through federal excise taxes on sport fishing equipment, import duties on fishing tackle and pleasure boats, and a portion of the gasoline fuel tax attributable to small engines and motorboats.
